~John Jay~

Patriot, Diplomat, Founding Father of the United States Essay by Charles Drucker, Student John I. Leonard High School, Greenacres, FL 2019 Palm Beach Chapter SAR Knight Essay Contest Winner

When asked about major figures during the American Revolutionary War, as well as the proceedings that occurred both before and thereafter, many Americans may be inclined to recall the names of statesmen such as Thomas Jefferson and George Washington.

However, amidst vividly-remembered historical events—from the Boston Tea Party in 1773, which fueled the American cause for independence, to Paul Revere's culturally-renowned 'Midnight Ride,' which served as one of many quintessential representations of the spirit and patriotism of colonists—important figures were inevitably lost in translation (Carp, 2011).

One of the most notable examples of whom is John Jay, a key figure throughout the United States cause for independence from Great Britain. Although much of his accomplishments have been left to gradually fade over time, the significance of his contributions have not, remaining relevant well within the 21st Century.

After establishing both an educational and professional career in law, Jay formalized his role in the political scene after advancing through the New York Committee of Correspondence, one of a series of intercolonial governmental organizations established among the Thirteen Colonies, primarily in response to the imposition of the Stamp Act in 1765 (Independence Hall Association).

As the chapter's secretary, Jay was a strong proponent of colonial property rights, which were being increasingly infringed upon by expanding British taxation measures.

Despite this conflict of principles, Jay continued to promote solutions rooted in diplomacy and the avoidance of complete conflict with the British Parliament as a delegate at the First Continental Congress in 1774 (Library of Congress).

Furthermore, in the following year, Jay served on the drafting committee that produced the Olive Branch Petition, along with other notable Patriots including Benjamin Franklin and John Dickinson (Boonshoft, 2015).

However, as violence overtook an agenda of peace and resolution—evidenced by actions of the British government during the outbreak of the Revolutionary War, including the Burning of Norfolk by Loyalist troops and the bombardment of coastal towns by British naval forces—Jay began to recognize the decreasing likelihood for unity and shifted his stance to one favoring the dissolution of ties with Britain.

This newly-formed vehement opposition towards reconciliation continued throughout the conflict, as Jay assisted in the drafting of the Declaration of Independence having been appointed the President of Second Continental Congress and served as the Secretary of Foreign Affairs (Jillson & Wilson, 1994).

As the United States' premier diplomat and Minister Plenipotentiary to Spain, Jay advocated for the recognition of American Independence, as well as sought financial aid from sovereign nations including Spain and France (United States Department of State, 2018).

The relationships he formed while officially representing the nation in the international community later positioned him to negotiate the parameters of the Treaty of Paris (1783) with Great Britain. Collectively working with both statesmen Benjamin Franklin and John Adams, Jay played a pivotal role in compromising with the representatives of King George III and was, therefore, a key signatory of the peace treaty that ended the American Revolutionary War (Library of Congress, 2018).

After the cessation of warfare between Britain and the colonies, Jay proceeded to serve the nation by five essays to the Federalist Papers, in collaboration with Alexander Hamilton and James Madison. His publishing's (as indicated under the pseudonym "Publius") presented crucial ideologies and arguments against the Articles of Confederation and the imperative nature of a strong, centralized government (Hart, 2013).

In Federalist No. 64, for instance, Jay outlines the functions of the Senate as the upper chamber of the United States Congress, and its significant role in the policymaking process by working with both members of the Executive and Judicial Branches of government (Hart, 2013).

The following year, Jay served as first Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, a position he chose under the administration of President George Washington, who encouraged Jay to be an active figure in his cabinet (Schwartz, 2014).

In totality, he oversaw the judicial proceedings of over five cases and effectively addressed issues regarding the legitimacy of the United States as an independent nation, separation of powers, the sovereignty of state governments, and the application of judicial review (Oyez, n.d.).

Moreover, Jay was also heavily involved in the negotiations that culminated into the "Treaty of Amity Commerce and Navigation, between His Britannic Majesty; and The United States of America, by Their President, with the advice and consent of Their Senate" (colloquially referred to as "John Jay's Treaty"), which sought to improve British-American relations and prevent the development of retaliatory belligerence (Lillian Goldman Law Library, 2008).

Throughout his involvement with the founding of the United States, Jay also maintained a substantial presence in the Province of New York, where generations of his mercantile family had lived since the 17th Century (Stahr, 2017).

Utilizing his position to persuade the masses, Jay sought a promotion of Patriotic values and led a coalition that highlighted the Intolerable Acts of the British Parliament. From 1795 to 1801, Jay held public office as the Second Governor of New York, a platform that allowed him to introduce various levels of reform that transformed the state into one of socioeconomic and political modernity (New York State).

In 1799, he signed a legislative bill that outlawed slavery, which was indicative of all the efforts he undertook towards the gradual emancipation of African-American slaves through his establishment of the New York Manumission Society in 1785 (New York State). In addition, Jay also resisted the implementation of gerrymandering, a process that was initially proposed to him by Alexander Hamilton and would likely been extremely beneficial for his party.

Despite the possibility for political gains, however, Jay recognized the lack of equality and impartiality involved with the technique and acted with moral integrity in mind.

After conducting relatively unsuccessful national campaigns for both the 1796 and 1801 Presidential Elections, Jay gradually removed himself from politics and declined future gubernatorial and judicial positions offered by the Federalists and United States Senate, respectively (Whitelock, 1887).

However, despite his decision of to relinquish himself from public governance, Jay's invaluable contributions and philosophies continued to have lasting effects on the operations of the country, just as during the times at which they have been originally expressed-from the drafting of the Declaration of Independence, the American Revolution, to the establishment of the United States Constitution.

Mr. Drucker has also volunteered with independent institutions, such as the Solid Waste Authority (SWA) of Palm Beach County and the Palm Springs Community Center. His efforts have culminated into over 240 hours of documented community service.

Mr. Drucker has also completed a 3-month financial internship in the private sector and simultaneously sustains a 4.0 cumulative GPA at Palm Beach State College, where he regularly takes both general education and specialized courses as a dual-enrollment student. After graduating, he plans to attend the University of Florida to study both business and law.

Mr. Drucker is the 2019 winner of the prestigious Palm Beach Chapter SAR Knight Essay **Contest,** and could go on to both SAR State and National Knight Essay competition.
