Respecting Our Flag... Honor Those Who Sacrificed at the Altar of Freedom! History of the American Flag!

Fellow Citizens who, in the name of the free speech rights afforded by the first amendment, choose to disrespect the *American Flag* and our *National Anthem* out of a perceived wrong or injustice are to be pitied for their ignorance of American History.

Our Constitution and Bill of Rights affords everyone the right to speak their mind and protest grievances as they choose, but their choice of venues brings into sharp focus both their ignorance of the meaning of the American Flag and our National Anthem.

As Patriots, I believe that it is our responsibility to educate our fellow citizens on the virtues and values of our founding fathers as embodied in the Constitution and Bill of Rights, and reaffirmed over the past 240 years by the sacrifices of so many at the *Altar of Freedom*.

We should endeavor to lead these citizens down the path of education, awareness and selfenlightenment on both the history and values of our Republic.

Part of that education is the meaning and history of the flag of the United States of America and the National anthem that symbolizes and reaffirms that we are a democratic republic of, by and for the people with these freedoms guaranteed for all Americans.

The American Flag was born on June 14, 1777, in Philadelphia where the Continental Congress adopted the stars and stripes as the national flag. The thirteen stripes alternating red and white, with a union of thirteen white stars in a field of blue, represented a new constellation, a new nation dedicated to the personal and religious liberty of all mankind.

The fifty stars that adorn our flag, one for each of the fifty sovereign states, signifies the greatest constitutional republic the world has ever known. Its colors symbolize the patriotic ideals and spiritual qualities of the citizens of America.

Its red stripes proclaim the fearless courage and integrity of American men and boys and the self-sacrifice and devotion of American mothers and daughters in defense of our virtues and values. The white stripes stand for liberty and equality for all and the blue reminds us of heaven, loyalty, and faith and represent these eternal principles: liberty, justice, and humanity.

The American flag embodies the promise of uniquely American freedom: freedom of speech, religion, assembly, the press, and the sanctity of the home.

Our flag typifies the indomitable spirit of determination brought to our land by all our forefathers the Pilgrims, Puritans, settlers at Jamestown and Plymouth, and the many great leaders who have shaped our unique republic.

Follow the evolution of the honored flag of the United States of America.....

Old Glory.....

- ✤ I am as old as my nation.
- I am a living symbol of my nation's law: the Constitution and the Bill of Rights.
- I voice Lincoln's philosophy: "A government of the people, by the people, for the people."
- ✤ I support the nation's schools, the seedbed of good citizenship and patriotism.
- I am displayed in every schoolroom and schoolyard throughout my nation.
- Daily thousands of our children pledge their allegiance to me and my country.
- ✤ My own Public Law 829, "The Flag Code", defines my correct use and display.
- I have my own special day, Flag Day June 14, to honor my birth.
- I am the sacred emblem of our country symbolizing the birthright and heritage of liberty for all Americans purchased with blood and treasure of our forefathers.
- ✤ I am the deed of freedom for Americans to enjoy and hold in trust for posterity.
- I pray Americans to keep this sacred trust inviolate for if nullified we risk becoming slaves to despots.
- Maintaining vigilance for all enemies domestic and foreign is the price of freedom so guard me well, lest our freedoms perish.
- Commit to the virtues: "One nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."
- As you see me silhouetted against the peaceful skies, remember that I am the flag of your country, standing for the "land of the free and the home of the brave"!
- ✤ I shall ever be known as "Old Glory," the flag of the United States of America!
- ✤ God grant that we spend eternity in the shadow of Old Glory!

Evolution of the United States Flag

No one knows with absolute certainty who designed the first stars and stripes or who made it. Congressman Francis Hopkinson seems most likely to have designed it, and a few historians believe that Betsy Ross, a Philadelphia seamstress, made the first one.

Until the Executive Order of June 24, 1912, neither the order of the stars nor the proportions of the flag was prescribed.

Consequently, flags dating before this period sometimes show unusual arrangements of the stars and odd proportions, these features being left to the discretion of the flag maker.

In general, however, straight rows of stars and proportions similar to those later adopted officially were used. The principal acts affecting the flag of the United States are the following:

• **On June 14, 1777**, in order to establish an official flag for the new nation, the Continental Congress passed the first Flag Act resolving that the flag of the United States be made of thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new Constellation."

- Act of January 13, 1794 provided for 15 stripes and 15 stars after May 1795.
- Act of April 4, 1818 provided for 13 stripes and one star for each state, to be added to the flag on the 4th of July following the admission of each new state.
- Executive Order of President Taft dated June 24, 1912 established proportions of the • flag and provided for arrangement of the stars in six horizontal rows of eight each, a single point of each star to be upward.
- Executive Order of President Eisenhower dated January 3, 1959 provided for the arrangement of the stars in seven rows of seven stars each, staggered horizontally and vertically.
- Executive Order of President Eisenhower dated August 21, 1959 provided for the arrangement of the stars in nine rows of stars staggered horizon tally and eleven rows of stars staggered vertically.



The Grand Union Flag

The Grand Union 1775: Also known as the Continental flag, it is the first true U.S. Flag. It combined the British King's Colours and the thirteen stripes signifying Colonial unity. George Washington liked this design so well that he chose it to be flown to celebrate the formation of the Continental Army on New Year's Day, 1776. On that day the Grand Union Flag was proudly raised on Prospect Hill in Somerville, near his headquarters at Cambridge, Massachusetts

The Gadsden Flag





The rattlesnake was the favorite animal emblem of the Americans even before the Revolution. In 1751 Benjamin Franklin's *Pennsylvania Gazette* carried a bitter article protesting the British practice of sending convicts to America.

The author suggested that the colonists return the favor by shipping "a cargo of rattlesnakes, which could be distributed in St. James Park, Spring Garden, and other places of pleasure, and particularly in the noblemen's gardens." Three years later the same paper printed the picture of a snake as a commentary on the Albany Congress. To remind the delegates of the danger of disunity, the serpent was shown cut to pieces. Each segment is marked with the name of a colony, and the motto "Join or Die" below. Other newspapers took up the snake theme.

By 1774 the segments of the snake had grown together, and the motto had been changed to read: *"United Now Alive and Free Firm on this Basis Liberty Shall Stand and Thus Supported Ever Bless Our Land Till Time Becomes Eternity"* Other authors felt the rattlesnake was a good example of America's virtues. They argued that it is unique to America; individually its rattles produce no sound, but united they can be heard by all; and while it does not attack unless provoked, it is deadly to step upon one.

The Gadsden Flag: The American Revolutionary period was a time of intense but controlled individualism - when self-directing responsible individuals again and again decided for themselves what they should do, and did it- without needing anyone else to give them an assignment or supervise them in carrying it out.

Such a person was the patriot Colonel Christopher Gadsden of South Carolina. He had seen and liked a bright yellow banner with a hissing, coiled rattlesnake rising up in the center, and beneath the serpent the same words that appeared on the Striped Rattlesnake Flag - *Don't Tread On Me*. Colonel Gadsden made a copy of this flag and submitted the design to the Provincial Congress in South Carolina. Commodore Esek Hopkins, commander of the new Continental fleet, carried a similar flag in February, 1776, when his ships put to sea for the first time.

Hopkins captured large stores of British cannon and military supplies in the Bahamas. His cruise marked the salt-water baptism of the American Navy, and it saw the first landing of the Corps of Marines, on whose drums the Gadsden symbol was painted

The Bennington Flag



The Bennington Flag: Used in the Battle of Bennington, August 16, 1777, by Vermont militia. This flag is the first to lead American armed forces on land. The original is preserved in the museum at Bennington, Vermont.

The Serapis Flag



The Serapis Flag: Designed with 13 stripes alternating red, white and blue. This flag was raised by Captain John Paul Jones on the British frigate *Serapis* during the most famous Revolutionary naval battle. Jones was born John Paul in Scotland in 1747 and went to sea when he was only twelve years old. By the time he arrived in Philadelphia in 1775 as an experienced sea captain, he had changed his name to John Paul Jones.

After conducting sea raids on the coast of Britain, he took command in 1779 of a rebuilt French merchant ship, renamed the U.S.S. Bonhomme Richard to honor Benjamin Franklin. On September 23, 1779, Jones engaged the British frigate Serapis in the North Sea, daringly sailing in close, lashing his vessel to the British ship, and fighting the battle at point-blank range. During the fight two of his cannon burst, and the British captain asked Jones if he was ready to surrender. Replied Jones: "*Sir, I have not yet begun to fight.*" The American crew finally boarded the *Serapis* after the British had struck her colors, and from the deck of the *Serapis* they watched the *U.S.S. Bonhomme Richard* sink into the North Sea.

The Betsy Ross Flag



Since there was no official flag during the first year of the United States, there were a great number of homespun flag designs. This flag is without question the most well-known of those. There are many reasons why this flag is confused with the first official U.S. flag.

Washington's Flag 1775



Washington's Flag 1775: This was the personal flag of the Commander-In-Chief during the Revolutionary War. A reproduction of this flag flies today at Washington's Headquarters, Valley Forge.

The First Official United States Flag; 13-Stars



The First Official United States Flag: This 13-Star Flag became the Official United States Flag on June14, 1777 and is the result of the congressional action that took place on that date. Much evidence exists pointing to Congressman <u>Francis Hopkinson</u> as the person responsible for its design.

The first President to serve under this flag was <u>George Washington (1789-1797)</u>. This Flag design was to last for a period of 18 years.

Each star *and* stripe represented a Colony of which there were thirteen, united nearly one year earlier by the Declaration of Independence. The thirteen Colonies are listed below with the date that each ratified the Constitution and became a State.

- (1st) Delaware December 7th, 1787
- (2nd) Pennsylvania December 12th,1787
- (3rd) New Jersey December 18th, 1787
- (4th) Georgia January 2nd, 1788
- (5th) <u>Connecticut</u> January 9th, 1788
- (6th) Massachusetts February 6th, 1788
- (7th) Maryland April 28th, 1788
- (8th) South Carolina May 23rd, 1788
- (9th) New Hampshire June 21st, 1788
- (10th) <u>Virginia</u> June 25th, 1788
- (11th) <u>New York</u> July 25th, 1788
- (12th) North Carolina November 21st, 1789
- (13th) Rhode Island May 29th, 1790

The Star Spangled Banner 15-Star Flag



The Star Spangled Banner: This Flag became the Official United States Flag on May 1st, 1795. Two stars were added for the admission of <u>Vermont</u> (the 14th State on March 4th, 1791) and <u>Kentucky</u> (the 15th State on June 1st, 1792, and was to last for 23 years.

The five Presidents who served under this flag were; <u>George Washington (1789-1797)</u>, <u>John Adams (1797-1801)</u>, <u>Thomas Jefferson (1801-1809)</u>, <u>James Madison (1809-1817)</u>, and <u>James Monroe (1817-1825)</u>.

The 15-star, 15-stripe flag was authorized by the Flag Act of January 13, 1794, adding 2 stripes and 2 Stars. The regulation went into effect on May 1, 1795. This flag was the only U.S. Flag to have more than 13 stripes.

The flag was immortalized by <u>Francis Scott Key</u> during the bombardment of *Fort McHenry*, Sept 13, 1814. The image above is representative of the actual flag that flew over Fort McHenry on that day and which is now preserved in the Smithsonian Museum. You can notice the "tilt" in some of the stars just as in the <u>original Star Spangled Banner</u>.

The remarkable journey of the original Star Spangled Banner Flag...

-1814

The battle occurred, and the flag won its glory. Armistead was promoted to Lt. Colonel by Madison. Armistead died in service on April 25, 1818. He acquired the flag sometime before that date, but at this point it is unknown how.

-1818

Armistead died and "legend" says that the flag was used in his funeral. However, in all of the newspaper accounts of Armistead's funeral, there is no mention of the flag being displayed at it. At his death the flag passed to his widow, Louisa Armistead. -1824

The flag was used in a reception for General Lafayette.

-1861

Louisa Armistead died on October 3, 1861, and in her will left the flag to her daughter, Georgiana Armistead Appleton. The flag was sent to England for safe keeping during the Civil War, according to one of the Armistead family members, who made this statement in a newspaper interview in the 1880's. But Georgiana said, in a letter to Admiral George Preble, that the flag was in her possession during the rebellion.

-1873

The flag was displayed in the Charleston Naval Yards. Canvas backing was sewn on the flag and one of the first photographs was taken of it.

-1876

The flag was loaned to the Navy Department for the Centennial Celebration.

-1879

Georgiana Armistead Appleton died in 1879 and left the flag to her son Eben Appleton. **-1907**

Eben Appleton loaned the flag to the Smithsonian.

-1912

Eben Appleton converts the loan of the flag to a gift to the Smithsonian.

-1914

Amelia Fowler was commissioned to remove the canvas backing sewn on the flag when it was photographed in 1873 and replace it with the present linen backing.



The 1818 20-Star Flag

The 1818 Flag: Realizing that the addition of a new star and new stripe for each new State was impractical, Congress passed the Flag Act of 1818 which returned the flag design to 13 stripes and specified 20 stars for the 20 states. This Flag became the Official United States Flag on April 13th, 1818. Five stars were added for the admission of <u>Tennessee</u> (the 16th State on June 1st, 1796), <u>Ohio</u> (the 17th State on March 1st, 1803), <u>Louisiana</u> (the 18th State on April 30th, 1812), <u>Indiana</u> (the 19th State on December 11th, 1816), and <u>Mississippi</u> (the 20th State on December 10, 1817), and was to last for just one year. The only President to serve under this flag was James Monroe (1817-1825).

ORIGINAL "OLD GLORY"



This famous name was coined by Captain William Driver, a shipmaster of Salem, Massachusetts, in 1831. As he was leaving on one of his many voyages aboard the brig CHARLES DOGGETT - and this one would climax with the rescue of the mutineers of the BOUNTY - some friends presented him with a beautiful flag of twenty four stars. As the banner opened to the ocean breeze for the first time, he exclaimed "Old Glory!"

He retired to Nashville in 1837, taking his treasured flag from his sea days with him. By the time the Civil War erupted, most everyone in and around Nashville recognized Captain Driver's "Old Glory." When Tennessee seceded from the Union, Rebels were determined to destroy his flag, but repeated searches revealed no trace of the hated banner.

Then on February 25th, 1862, Union forces captured Nashville and raised the American flag over the capital. It was a rather small ensign and immediately folks began asking Captain Driver if "Old Glory" still existed. Happy to have soldiers with him this time, Captain Driver went home and began ripping at the seams of his bedcover. As the stitches holding the quilt-top to the batting unraveled, the onlookers peered inside and saw the 24-starred original "Old Glory"!

Captain Driver gently gathered up the flag and returned with the soldiers to the capitol. Though he was sixty years old, the Captain climbed up to the tower to replace the smaller banner with his beloved flag. The Sixth Ohio Regiment cheered and saluted - and later adopted the nickname "Old Glory" as their own, telling and re-telling the story of Captain Driver's devotion to the flag we honor yet today.

Captain Driver's grave is located in the old Nashville City Cemetery, and is one of three (3) places authorized by act of Congress where the Flag of the United States may be flown 24 hours a day. A caption above a faded black and white picture in the book, The Stars and the Stripes, states that "Old Glory' may no longer be opened to be photographed, and no color photograph is available." Visible in the photo in the lower right corner of the canton is an appliqued anchor, Captain Driver's very personal note. "Old Glory" is the most illustrious of a number of flags - both Northern and Confederate - reputed to have been similarly hidden, then later revealed as times changed. The flag was given to his granddaughter or niece and she later donated it to the Smithsonian.

The 50-Star Flag



50-Star Flag: Executive Order of President Eisenhower dated August 21, 1959 - provided for the arrangement of the stars in nine rows of stars staggered horizon tally and eleven rows of stars staggered vertically.

This is the current flag of the United States. <u>Hawaii</u> was admitted as the 50th state on August 21st, 1959.

The 27th flag of the United States became the official flag on July 4th, 1960. Twelve American presidents have served under this flag!
